Her children did their homework at the library since they did not have Internet access. When she finished her course work, library staff members helped her create a resume. She found employment in her field. About two months ago I ran into her and she beamed with the news that her oldest was accepted at college. She said, "If it was not for the library, I don't know what we would have done."

I don't know how to put an economic price on this impact, but the value is priceless!


